VISION

Three words for us to connect this month.

Epiphany means, in the words of the 2018 **Book** of Common Worship, "manifestation or revelation. At the Epiphany of the Lord we celebrate the manifestation of God saving purpose to all the nations of the world. Just as the magi came for a distant land to worship the Christ child, God's covenant of grace is extended to all people who believe the good news of Jesus Christ (more on this definition as a limitation of God's grace later). The symbolism of light is important – not only because of the star that guided the magi, but as it suggest the bright dawning of God' self-revelation in Jesus Christ. As Christians, we are called to bear Christ's light in the world.

Stewardship, as Walter Brueggemann states in his **Money and Possession**, is based on the understanding that "money and possession belong to God and are held in trust by human persons in community." He writes, "a steward is the master of the house hold who is responsible for its proper management, a role assigned to the human couple in the Genesis creation narrative concerning having dominion (Gen. 1:28). The steward is not the owner but is accountable to the owner... The whole earth is the creation that belongs to the Creator who has the whole world in his hands.' This means, of course, that the stewards, all those who hold possessions in trust, are accountable for their use and management."

"Where there is no vision, the people perish..."(Psalm 29:18 KJV) "Write the vision; make it plain on tablets so that a runner may read it. For there is still a vision for the appointed time..."(Habakkuk 2:2-3) Acts tells us that our young shall see visions and our old shall dream dreams. Vision is the ability to see, to see the purpose and direction God has for our community of faith. This vision, a gift of the Holy Spirit, shows us the future God puts before us and Christ calls us into.

Over the next two months we will be experiencing the intersection of these three words. The Epiphany Season, January 6 through the beginning of Lent, will find us exploring what it means for us to be the manifestation, making real that God "is with us" in this particular time and place. What are the ways that we, as two congregations becoming one, will be able to witness to the grace of God in this incredibly complex time?

During this time, we will also be exploring wealth of resources God's gracious generosity has provided through the people of this emerging congregation. Christ is truly turning the water of our individual abilities and resources into the rich, full bodied, blended wine to be served through the ministry of this new congregation at this time and in this place. From this will come the inspired vision of who and what this congregation will be in the service of the God who is with us. We will find an inspired vision for the future that will strengthen the faith and provide care for the aging people in our midst, while also sharing the drink of new life with those around us.

I invite you to join with us as we make real the presence of God with us, as explore how we can best use the resources God has provided for living into Christ's vision of who we are becoming.
