Connecting Thoughts

This Sunday, June 28th will mark a momentous moment. It will be the 87th time the congregations of the Covenant Presbyterian Church and the Ewing Presbyterian Church have joined together to worship in an exploration of how the two might become one. Over those 87 Sundays we have slowly become one in all but the eyes of the State of New Jersey, and New Brunswick Presbytery. This Sunday that will change as both congregations will take the actions necessary to become one congregation within the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.), and one corporation within the state.

This is no small step, but rather a great stride in becoming the church, and the people of God, Christ is calling us to be. And, it is no accident that this is happening at this particular time. As we exist in the midst of the Covid Pandemic, we see how true it is that our witness to the grace of God, the presence of Christ in our midst every moment, the reality of the work of the all-pervasive Spirit encompassing us, must continually change to meet the moment in which we live. The actions we take, and those of the Administrative Commission acting as New Brunswick Presbytery, will free us to move into the future God has given us.

Following these thoughts, you will find the agenda we will follow when we gather for our two congregational meetings. We will gather together in the same Zoom space we will have worshipped in. You will **not** need to enter a different meeting. Our meetings will be opened with prayer, and each congregation will

consider and vote on its own motions. There will then be a prayer of thanksgiving for the lives and ministries of the two congregations, and for all the saints who have served our Lord through lives of faith lived out in these two communities of faith. The Administrative Commission of New Brunswick Presbytery will then meet to carry out the Presbytery's required to dissolve the two congregations, and to officially form the Ewing-Covenant Presbyterian Church (Sandra Austin, Carol Hecky, Mike Cieplechowicz, and Don Lovett have served faithfully on that Commission). With the completion of those actions with prayer, we will then join in celebration and song, giving praise for what God has done in our midst

Plan to have something ready to make noise wherever you are. A coffee can with stones, bells, pans, trash can lids, whatever you have to use. Plan to raise your voice in praise, and to make a holy ruckus.

An Invitation to an Online Vacation Bible School

Hello, Ewing/Covenant families!



I am writing to invite your child/children to participate in a "virtual"

Vacation Bible School with us at Lawrence Road Presbyterian that will take place the week of July 6 - 10. It is called "Compassion Camp," and uses five Biblical stories to help children learn five truths about compassion:

- Compassion helps us see and welcome others
- Compassion helps us be brave
- Compassion helps us love ourselves
- Compassion helps us be present with each other
- Compassion gives us a fresh start

The curriculum is developed by Illustrated Children's Ministry, the same folks who developed free lessons during Lent and materials for helping children to deal with anxiety when the coronavirus first emerged. Some of you may remember their lovely, creative coloring pages.

The plan is for a one- to two-hour mixture of online (live or pre-recorded) story-telling, music, movement, coloring, crafts done as part of and after the day's session, and activities that demonstrate compassion in action, like writing a "thank you" letter to delivery persons who bring our mail or food orders to our doors. Each day, the children will also will find and color illustrations of each of the five compassion themes that are acted out on a large Compassion Camp Poster (11 x 17").

Every child will receive a kit that includes materials for each day and a variety of craft materials, for which there is no charge. We will

also provide directions (as simple as possible) for making the online connections.

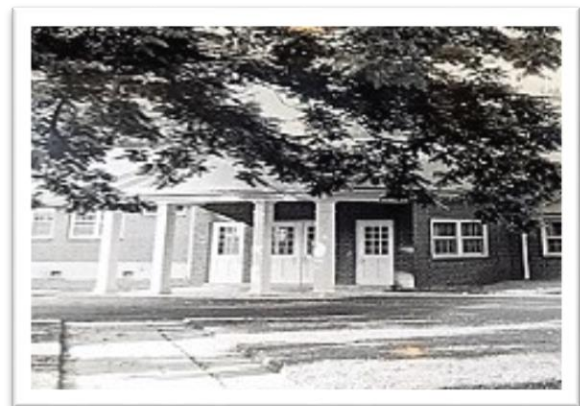

What's New in The World of Operations July 2020

The Operations Committee, formerly known as Buildings and Grounds, has been very busy behind the scenes during these last number of months. We have been working on the planning and execution of a number of capital improvement projects, and we would like to provide an update on the status of our work.

••There is an underground oil tank behind the Scout Hut that is in need of removal. Quick Environmental Services is the contractor that will be completing this project for the church. The tank removal has been scheduled for Friday, June 19. An inspector from Ewing Township will also be present during the removal.



••The entry foyer and the front restrooms in Fellowship Hall are undergoing a much needed makeover. The old wall paper has been removed and the walls have been spackled and sanded in preparation for fresh paint and a clean, new look.



••The church office building is in need of a new water heater to supply hot water to the first floor office restroom and the restroom on the second floor. The replacement is planned to occur following the receipt of all required permits.

In addition to the work noted above, there are projects of a larger scope that have been in the planning phase. These projects require an architect, a general contractor, a licensed electrician, and a specialty contractor. All contractors selected for these projects have completed a proposal and bidding process prior to selection. Contracts have been drawn up with each of them and reviewed by the church attorney prior to sign off. We are now ready to begin the next phase for each.

••To start, portions of the electric service in the basement of Fellowship Hall are in need of an upgrade. This service supplies power to Fellowship Hall, the Education Wing, the Red and White Building, and the Scout Hut. An important note; the service that provides power to the central air unit in Fellowship Hall is in proper working order, and is not included in the scope of this project.

The decision to complete the upgrade was based on safety concerns that were identified following a full evaluation of the electric service. The full evaluation evolved as a result of an investigation into why a circuit breaker did not properly trip when it should have. The evaluation was conducted by three

independent licensed electricians, one of which was selected for this project which will begin following the receipt of all required permits.

••The church office porch will be undergoing reconstruction and that project will be getting underway following the receipt of all required permits. When completed, the project will result in a new porch deck, front and side steps, railings, columns, lighting, and an exterior wheelchair lift. The wheelchair lift is one of several options that were explored by the Operations Committee and is a must to allow the church to meet the requirements for ADA compliance for a public use building.



••An additional element to the office porch reconstruction project is the replacement of the back steps behind the church office

building. During the reconstruction project, the front door to the church office will not be accessible, and the back door and steps will be needed to allow access into and out of the building. The back steps are in need of replacement due to safety concerns. This project will be the first phase of the porch reconstruction project and will begin following the receipt of all required permits.

••The last project to note is the replacement of the interior wheelchair lift in Fellowship Hall. The contractor who regularly services and maintains the lift advised us that it was reaching the end of its service life and based on safety concerns, recommended that the church replace the lift. That project will also begin following the receipt of all required permits.

Please look for future updates in the Newsletter related to these projects as we continue to keep you informed of our progress.

DEACONS WORK BEHIND THE SCENES

When you think of the deacons and what they do, you think of us ushering, delivering flowers, helping to organize coffee hour and planning fellowship events for the congregation. However, the combined Ewing – Covenant board of deacons have been working behind the scenes as we continue to reach out and care for our church family and the wider community. We have been meeting monthly via Zoom to discuss ways that we can continue to carry on God's work during this pandemic. The money donated for Easter flowers was disbursed for Covid-19 aid, and \$250 was donated to the pastor's discretionary fund. So for now, our message is stay well, call, write, email, use social media and keep in contact with each other. State offers COVID-19 Emergency Rental Assistance Program

The COVID-19 Emergency Rental Assistance Program offered through the New Jersey Department of Community Affairs (DCA) will provide temporary rental assistance to low- and moderate-income households that have had a substantial reduction in income or became unemployed due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

Applicants may be eligible for a maximum of up to six months of emergency rental assistance. The assistance will be capped at DCA's fair market rent standard or the total of the rent, whichever is less. All participants will be reviewed at the three-month interval to see if they are still in need of assistance.

Applicants must meet all applicable COVID-19 Emergency Rental Assistance Program income and eligibility requirements. You must be 18 years of age or older to apply or be an emancipated minor. **Only one pre-application per household will be accepted.** All participants will be selected through an online lottery process.

Enrollment period is **Monday, July 6, at 9 a.m. until Friday, July 10, at 5 p.m.** For more information on the program and how to apply, go to: <https://www.nj.gov> look under Housing & Community Resources.
