Ordinary Angels

Writing in this final week of December, I am reflecting upon the experience of Advent in your midst so far... I have heard many stories of your Christmas celebrations of the past. How each person has memories of family customs through the years, bringing home a tree and decorating it -- draping the lights on the boughs, getting the treasured star or angel on the very top branch.

One of you related how, in this 11th decade of your life, the rituals of unwrapping ornaments and placing them on the Christmas tree, and

decorating your home with a much-loved creche, has offered unexpected comfort in this time of isolation. Each ornament and each piece of the creche evoking memories within you of the church event where each was purchased and the dear church friend who created each one.

For myself, I have been thinking of my ceramic angel, one of the many projects I made in church youth group. Our youth group leader, Mrs. Smith, would arrive most weeks with a plain ceramic item for each of us; she placed glazes in the middle of the table and fanned out brushes of all sorts -- we could choose several for our own use. Usually, we painted the ceramic pieces as we wished, but the angel was different, it was to be completely glazed in one color, with a specified trim glaze placed on the wings. Mrs. Smith would not provide even a hint as to what the angels might look like once they were fired in a kiln. Some weeks passed, and then the time came. A finished angel was returned to each one of us. When I unwrapped the paper from mine, I gasped. My angel was a brilliant glossy white and her wings were delicately tinged with a richly burnished shade of gold.

My mother displayed the angel during Advent and Christmas -- sometimes she sat on the fireplace mantel, other years she was placed in a creche scene. Eventually the angel came to be part of our own family's Christmas tradition throughout the years when our kids were growing up. In recent years, I had forgotten all about her. But this year is different. I went in search of her, eventually finding her in the dining room buffet, stored on a low shelf. I realized I had not brought her out for Advent and Christmas for several years. And I had forgotten one detail: that she kneels on a base which is a star; a star outlined in the rich burnished shade of gold. That I had lost track of the angel's whereabouts does not really matter. What matters is the memories she stirs and the relationships she reminds me of: old childhood friends in the church, Mrs. Smith's

steadfast love and care that she gave to me, that she gave to all of us.

This year, as I suspect many of you have discovered, we have been angels to and for each other. Extraordinary angels really, showing love to each other in what appear to be ordinary ways -- snail mail and phone calls and such. But I imagine that there are many stories this year that I have yet to be told: how each one of you has been an extraordinary angel in the life of someone else. Just doing ordinary but extraordinary things, sharing frustrations and griefs, saying prayers. And unto and for each other, proclaiming God's comfort, solace and above all, hope.

Updates from Operations

The Operations Committee is very happy to provide an update on the capital improvement projects to be completed on the church campus. Over the summer, the contractors doing the work for the church had experienced long delays in the permit application process. One cause for the delay was due to the impacts of Covid-19 on the hours and operations at the Ewing Township Construction Office.

Following the approval of the permit

applications, work has been proceeding along at a good pace. As of the writing of this article, the following work has been completed on the porch project.

- All concrete footings for the front porch and the rear steps, and the concrete base for the exterior wheelchair lift have been poured and have passed inspection by Ewing Township.
- The front porch footings, deck framing, and roof supports are under construction and near completion.
- The rear steps and platform to the church office building are under construction and near completion.
- The power supply for the exterior lift has been installed.
- Both the interior and exterior wheelchair lifts have been shipped from Canada where they were manufactured, and are being housed at Mobility Elevator in West Caldwell, N.J. awaiting shipment to the church for installation.



In addition to the porch project, attention has been given to other areas

of the campus buildings. There was a need to repair a leak in the roof of the Education wing and another in the roof of the breezeway connecting the Red & White Building and Fellowship Hall. Both leaks were successfully repaired in November.

Plumbing repairs were needed to several areas in the Education Wing and the kitchen in Fellowship Hall. One of the sinks in the girl's restroom needed new faucets and trap. The water supply shut off valves to the boy's and girl's restrooms in the Education wing in the Custodian's closet were in need of replacement. One additional item was the need to replace the wastewater pipes that empty into the grease

trap under the triple sinks in the kitchen. All these items were leaking and malfunctioning due to their age, and all the noted repairs were completed on the same day.

The tap to the sink in the coffee room of Fellowship Hall had a substantial leak and John Damrau was able to make that repair.

Pastor Ann's office will be moved to the second floor of the church office building. In preparation for that, the office has had cosmetic work which includes spackling and sanding cracks in the plaster walls and ceiling along with a fresh coat of paint to the ceiling, walls, and trim. The old carpeting was also removed, and new flooring is being installed. We anticipate that Ann's new office will be ready for her to move into in the next several weeks.

The black wrought iron railings on three sets of steps to the Red & White Building and by the front entrance to Fellowship Hall were scraped and painted by John with a fresh coat of black Rustoleum paint. There's more work ahead and the Operations Committee will update you with the progress as we go along.

We are truly grateful for your gift and we thank you.



Dear Friends,

I write with a deeply troubled heart to let you know that early this morning fire caused heavy damage to the Martin Luther King Community Presbyterian Church in Springfield MA, the only African American church within the Presbytery of Southern New England. No one was hurt, but the church is unusable. The Springfield Arson and Bomb Squad, the State Police Arson and Bomb Squad, the Federal Bureau of Investigations, and the Federal Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, and Firearms are investigating the fire. Clearly, there is a question of arson. When a reporter asked why the FBI was involved, an official said that the church fire happened at night and therefore has to be treated as a hate crime.

Lisa Baker, Synod Commission member representing the Presbytery of Southern New England, is a member of this church. She is grateful that given the pandemic the church has been worshipping and doing its community work online and will continue to do so. Her voice was filled with resilience and with faith that the church community will pull through this. General Presbyter, Rev. Shannan

Vance Ocampo, left her home in Albany to drive to the church and be with the church community. She reported that Presbyterian Disaster Assistance (PDA) has already been contacted. Shannan promised to stay in touch with information about the investigation and about the church.

The mere fact that there is even a question of arson reminds us of a long history of racism that drives angry White people to burn Black churches that are sanctuaries and sacred spaces where Black people have gathered to worship God and to hold together as a community. It compels us as Christians to profess and live into the fundamental requirement to be our sisters' and brothers' keepers in this time of sorrow and their time of need. It compels us to search our souls to determine what we can do to help bring about racial justice within our church and within the land.

In closing, let me say to the Pastor and members of Martin Luther King Community Presbyterian Church, stand resolute. Isaiah 41:10 tells us, "Fear not, for I am with you; be not dismayed, for I am your God; I will strengthen you, I will help you, I will uphold you with my righteous right hand."


Loving God with all your mind


