An Irresistible Season

To everything there is a season, and time for every purpose under heaven.

The first strawberries of the year are, of course, irresistible. When I was young, springtime was announced by delicate berries peeking up from their straw bedding, their fragile, all-important "runners" creeping serpent-like everywhere. Picking the berries was like playing a game of Twister—it required a keen eye, and determination to choose right places to step, and

balance was key. Taking fruit from the vine had to be done gently, to preserve the plant's capacity to yield more fruit. But inevitably, the crisp coolness of a spring morning would give way to summer heat as the sun rose in the sky; berry picking would then be finished for the day. But the sweetness of the berries, and their abundance, always compelled me to go picking again the next day. How could I resist?

And so it is with ministry. Transitional ministers, as a breed, find the shifting seasons of a congregation compelling. There is a spiritual sweetness, and aliveness in ministry which could never be truly appreciated without also tasting the bitterness of change, feeling some unease, and experiencing loss which inevitably touches most everything sooner or later. Just as a gardener turns the soil, adds mulch, sows seed, and plucks out weeds, so do transitional pastors tend, abiding with cycles of fallowness, new growth, harvest. Sometimes things all run together, and what seemed simple is rather complicated. The real challenge is balance: to find the "sweet spot" between holding things together and letting go of things. Discerning whether to remain tending a ministry, or let it go. Knowing when to coax forth aliveness, and when to accept it is time to let the soil rest. The labor, the joy, and the humility of it all is.... irresistible.

As Pastor Paul prepares for his retirement, I too pour myself out, in what is a poignant season for our church. My serving as Transitional Pastor being God's plan and a blessing, I will stay only until the next pastor is chosen. Meanwhile, I am stepping into openness, being careful of the delicate roots visible, and curious about the tendrils hidden from my sight. With guidance from Pastor Paul, I am shaping myself even now to carry out existing responsibilities while adding new tasks, stepping back, and viewing our church through a wider lens. What can we expect? Perhaps fronds of new growth -- prayed for, longhoped for-- which will delight. Yet I am aware of places of unease, within myself, within the Session, perhaps us all. There may be tending which I am compelled to do which is outside my comfort zone. I will need your forbearance, and I pray for God's grace.

But know that no matter what, the labor, the humility, and the exquisite sweetness we experience in this season together.... well, it could prove to be irresistible.

Vision Quest Conversations June 6th and 20th

The Vision Team will host two more short conversations on the new Vision and Mission Statement for the church on Sundays, June 6th and 20th, following worship and a short fellowship time. Each of the conversations will focus on three of the specific Mission Statements, seeking your insights into how this congregation can live into the Vision for ministry Christ has for this church.

Reopening the Church for Gathered Worship

At its May 25th meeting, the Session of the Church, following the recommendation of the Return to Church Committee, voted to move from stage 2 to stage 4 in the Multi-Stage Plan for reopening the Church Campus (see below).

<u>Multi-Stage Plan for Reopening the Church</u> Campus

(From Policy and Procedures for Reopening, Section III)

Stage 1: Activity limited to low-risk tasks essential to the church operations and weekly online virtual worship services.

Stage 2: Small groups of 10 persons or less attending in-person gatherings or meetings with significant safeguards.

Stage 3: Limited church worship and other activities for up to 38 persons with significant safeguards.

Stage 4: Expanded church worship and other activities for up to 72 persons with significant safeguards. (Note: effective May 19th, capacity limits have been lifted.).

Stage 5: Resume regular worship services and meetings only if the underlying risks are significantly reduced or eliminated and/or an effective and safe vaccine is available.

The action was taken after much discussion of the recent changes in guidelines from the CDC, from the New Jersey government, the continuing decline of the Covid Virus in Mercer County and surrounding areas, along with the information gathered in the most recent Return to Church survey, and the thoughts and words that had been shared with the Elders by members of the congregation. Throughout this conversation the major concerns were for the health and safety of the congregation and community. The expressed commitment to not making any decision that would automatically exclude any individuals or groups from the gathered life of the church was affirmed throughout the process. (Examples of such exclusion would be to not allow unvaccinated people to attend worship or saying people with compromised immune systems would not be able to attend gatherings.)

The Sessions decision to move to Stage 4 means that we can now allow larger gatherings in the church facilities. This will include gathering for inperson for worship in our Worship Space beginning June 20th. We will do so with significant safeguards in place, including:

- All worshippers, using the front entrance or the Head Start wing, are to check-in in the foyer before entering the Worship Space.
- Limit presence in the Worship Space to local and state guidelines consistent with social distancing,
- Social distancing as people enter the buildings, and in the Worship Space and Worship service.
- Wearing masks as you enter the buildings, throughout Worship and your time inside the building.

- Using hand sanitizer as you enter the building and at other times as appropriate.
- Attendees must complete and submit a Ewing-Covenant Presbyterian Church Covid-19
 Notice and Release Form. (You will receive this form prior to June 20th to fill out before attending to speed up the entry process.)
- Greeters will request worshippers to complete a Health Screening Questionnaire for Covid-19, that doubles as a tool to help tracking who has attended if it should become necessary.
- Singing in worship will be limited initially.
 Singers will be masked.

All worship services will continue to be made available via Zoom for those who are not able to or choose not to attend in person.

Our church staff involved in leading worship: Marianne Lauffer, Carol Houghton, Ann Schoonover, and Paul Rhebergen look forward to being with you in a time of worship that will be safe for all involved.

Moving Forward with Defining the Future Pastoral Leadership for Ewing Covenant Presbyterian Church

With Pastor Paul's retirement coming in August, the Session was faced with the decision of how to best provide for pastoral leadership for the future of the church. The current staffing structure of a full-time pastor and a part time pastor for elder and pastoral care was created specifically for the time of the two congregations blending, and the time that has followed. As that structure was created for the short-term issues specific to the blending and to the aging of the new congregation, it was acknowledged that it was not a model for leadership that could be financially sustained by the congregation over a long period of time.

At the recommendation of the Session's enhanced Personnel Committee, and with the concurrence of the Presbytery's Committee on Ministry Liaisons, the Session voted to use the opportunity of Pastor Paul's retirement to move to a one pastor model for pastoral leadership.

The next step in the process was to continue the relationship with the Rev. Ann Schoonover, having her step into the full-time position as Transitional Pastor for the Ewing -Covenant Church upon Pastor Paul's retirement. As the Transitional Pastor Ann will carry the responsibilities for

preaching, worship planning and leadership, serving as Moderator of the Session, head-of staff, provide pastoral care, and prepare the congregation for the calling of the next pastor. She will need the prayers and support of the whole congregation as she works to fulfill this new calling.

The Session will continue to work to provide for a smooth transition from the leadership of Pastor Paul to the leadership of Pastor Ann. The Spirit is at work in the midst of this congregation.

Planning is underway for **two special events.** both will be in person gatherings for worship and celebration.

Sunday, June 27 – 1st Anniversary Celebration of the Ewing-Covenant Presbyterian Church. People are needed to assist in planning, ordering, serving, grilling, set-up and take down for the picnic that will follow the 10:00 worship service.

Sunday, July 25 – The Farewell Part for Pastor Paul Volunteers are needed for the planning and arrangements for the congregation's celebration of Pastor Paul's ministry in our midst.

OUR FAITH CALLS US TO DO MORE ABOUT GUN VIOLENCE.

"All who live by the sword will die by the sword," said Jesus in Matthew 26:52b, admonishing Peter for drawing his weapon in defense.

- 100 people die every day from guns in the United States, 10 of these are children. (National Center for Health Statistics)
- The US rate of firearms deaths for children under fifteen is twelve times higher than 25 other industrialized countries combined. (International Journal of Epidemiology
- 40,000 Americans die from guns every year in the US. In three years of War in Iraq, 1700 American servicemen and women have been killed. In the same period of time, 90,000 Americans have died from guns on our own streets. (NCHS)
- Since 1933, when statistics were first kept, more Americans have been killed through gun violence in "peacetime" than have been killed in all of our nation's wars since 1776. (US Dept. of Defense and The World Almanac)
- The family handgun purchased for protection, is 22 times more likely to be used against a family member or friend than to stop an intruder. (FBI)
- 40% of gun owners keep their guns loaded, unlocked, and stored near ammunition.
- No government agency is allowed to impose minimum design and safety standards on domestically manufactured firearms. Toy guns and teddy bears are more regulated than American-made guns.
- Nationwide, in gun shows, unlicensed sellers can peddle arms to unknown persons with no questions asked.

• 70% of Americans, including NRA members, 2-1, favor stricter laws and regulations on the sale and ownership of handguns and assault weapons. (Nat'l Opinion Research Center, Univ. of Chicago)

When the call is connected, introduce yourself and say that you are calling because you want your legislator to take action on gun violence prevention. The individual answering the phone will pass your message on to the member of Congress.
