Dear Members and Friends of the
Congregation,

Happy New Year! Last year we said “Good Riddance!” to 2020--the year when Covid first broke out in the world. But it seems that 2020 was just a warm up for 2021, a year which challenged the world, and also our church! From ongoing renovation work on the church office building to Pastor Paul’s retirement in July, to the impact of the “Omicron” variant surfacing during Advent, to impatience with finding the next new pastor, our church withstood significant, unceasing change during 2021!

I recently read how rapid, transforming change is likely the “new normal”. First the corporate world, and now much of the entire world, is applying the phrase “VUCA”-- that is, circumstances marked by Volatility, Uncertainty, Complexity and Ambiguity. As the church and its mission is necessarily anchored in the world, 2022 and years to follow will find the church (and our particular church known as Ewing-Covenant Presbyterian Church) needing to skillfully navigate VUCA, adopting “change mindset”, and of course, praying a lot.

Is there a silver lining to this emerging reality? I don’t have an answer. As a believer and a theologian, I have a keen confidence in the Gospel. We know that the church has withstood persecution and has at times been favored by the dominant culture, the faithful have worshipped in small house churches and in breathtaking cathedrals. The Good News has adapted to new cultures, and anchored in places both hostile and welcoming. I expect that the church (and our church) will be quite different in the next 5 to 10 years, changing to more effectively proclaim the Good News and to better serve the world.

In the meantime, as I being to say Good-by to all of you and discern my next call in ministry, I hold as precious the church I have known in these last years: from my 2015 start with Covenant Presbyterian Church as a 10 -hour-a- week minister, to my service unto two blending congregations through 2018-2020, to my recent time (6 months or so) as Transitional Pastor of the new “Ewing-Covenant Presbyterian Church”. I will always treasure ROAM (Regional Older Adult Ministry) which marked deepening connection among Presbyterian churches in the Greater Trenton Area.

Looking forward is my natural inclination; it is the way of the Spirit to lead us into new circumstance and new life, always. Yet, as we entered Advent, some in the church wanted to look backwards, poring over disappointments. While my work entails being aware of the past, my leadership necessarily focuses upon the present and upon the future the Spirit calls us to embrace. So, know that I rejoice in being part of the ministry, mission, discipleship and worship at this church, even if it’s been just since 2015. And I pray for God’s continued blessings upon this able congregation!

RETURN TO CHURCH COMMITTEE

Sunday Morning Guidelines We welcome you as you enter for worship this morning. As you enter, we ask the following of you:

1. If you have not already done so, please fill out a "Hold Harmless" form. Remember that you only need to do this once. *
2. Fill out the Health Form for the day. This helps us know who is present so that we will be able to track who was in attendance should it become necessary for any health-related reason.*
3. We ask that you remain masked until you leave the worship service and are again outside.

WHY DO WE ASK THAT YOU CONTINUE TO WEAR A MASK? First, know that the Return to Church Committee and the Session are continually examining our protocols and procedures related to the COVID Pandemic. We realize that the State of New Jersey has eliminated almost all restrictions for those who are vaccinated and recommends social distancing and masking for those not vaccinated be continued. Yet, the Pandemic continues to be with us, and the new variants of the disease is heavily striking the unvaccinated. And, while the effectiveness of the vaccine is incredibly high, it is still possible for a vaccinated person to contract Covid while suffering symptoms at a less dangerous level. While the percentage of our congregation who have been vaccinated is high, we also know that there are those in our midst who are not able to be vaccinated for any number of reasons, including choice. We are an open congregation, welcoming any and all who come to gather with us in worship. We ask that all who attend our worship in person remain masked in order to respect and protect everyone, from the youngest child who cannot be vaccinated, to the oldest person who has been vaccinated but is still vulnerable to the Covid virus. It is for "the least of these" in our midst that we will continue to ask people to wear their mask during in-person worship.

We recognize that masking is difficult for some. If your mask becomes unbearable, we encourage you to step out of the worship service (yes, even during the sermon) and remove your mask once you have passed to the outside.

My Experience at the ESWA Christmas Party by Joanne Durham

We never know how and where the Holy Spirit will move us.

I was supposed to join my family in northern New Jersey to see my niece performing a lead part in the "Nutcracker" by the New Jersey Ballet. It would have been a nice "ritzy" event to attend in Morristown but the hours of driving round-trip there deterred me. Instead, Sandra Austin and Carol Hecky --- who are both active on the Adult Education, Mission and Social Justice Committee with me and volunteers at Eastern Service Workers of America (ESWA) -- invited me to be a Greeter at the ESWA Christmas Party for children that Saturday, December 18. I had no idea what I was doing or what would happen, but Carol always reminds us to "stretch" ourselves and take up a new thing -- just like the Bible says.

The venue was *Trenton Tabernacle Church* in the heart of Trenton. When I arrived at the church it was bustling with volunteers who were busy decorating, setting up an arts and crafts table, a game table, food, and recorded music. I saw organized boxes which were labeled A to Z in a classroom away from the main room filled with toys. The ESWA leader welcomed me, and others set up a table and two chairs for another volunteer and me so we could face those attending after they came through the door and descended the narrow stairs of this old building.

As families arrived, my job was to check them in off a list and ask for proof of vaccination for Covid-19. They had to wear a mask, too. Most used broken English and were a little nervous but their more confident children squeezed their hands for support. I could see the stress these parents -- most of whom live in poverty despite working one, two or three jobs -- melt away after they checked in and follow the happy noise of other children and Christmas music in the other room.

Eventually we had a lull, and I went down to the main room to see all the activity. It was amazing! Children were smiling, laughing and enjoying the crafts table, games and even the table where they wrap donated books to give to their siblings for Christmas. To my surprise, Santa Claus (*E-CPC member Bonnie Brandt*) showed up with bells and really energized the room! She did Simon Says and other games and the joy I saw and heard was PRICELESS! When she gave out the boxes of toys to these families, they were very grateful.

Witnessing their joy was transformative for me. I knew God had better plans for me on that Saturday after all.

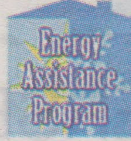

LOW-INCOME HOME ENERGY ASSISTANCE PROGRAM (LIHEAP)

2021-2022 PROGRAM BEGINS October 1, 2021



The County of Mercer will be accepting applications for the **Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP)** for the 2021-22 season beginning **October 1, 2021**. Mercer County will continue accepting applications for the **Universal Service Fund (USF) Program throughout the year**. Residents who pay their own heating costs, and meet the following income guidelines, may be eligible to receive financial assistance with their winter heating bill. Residents with medical conditions may also be eligible to receive cooling assistance:

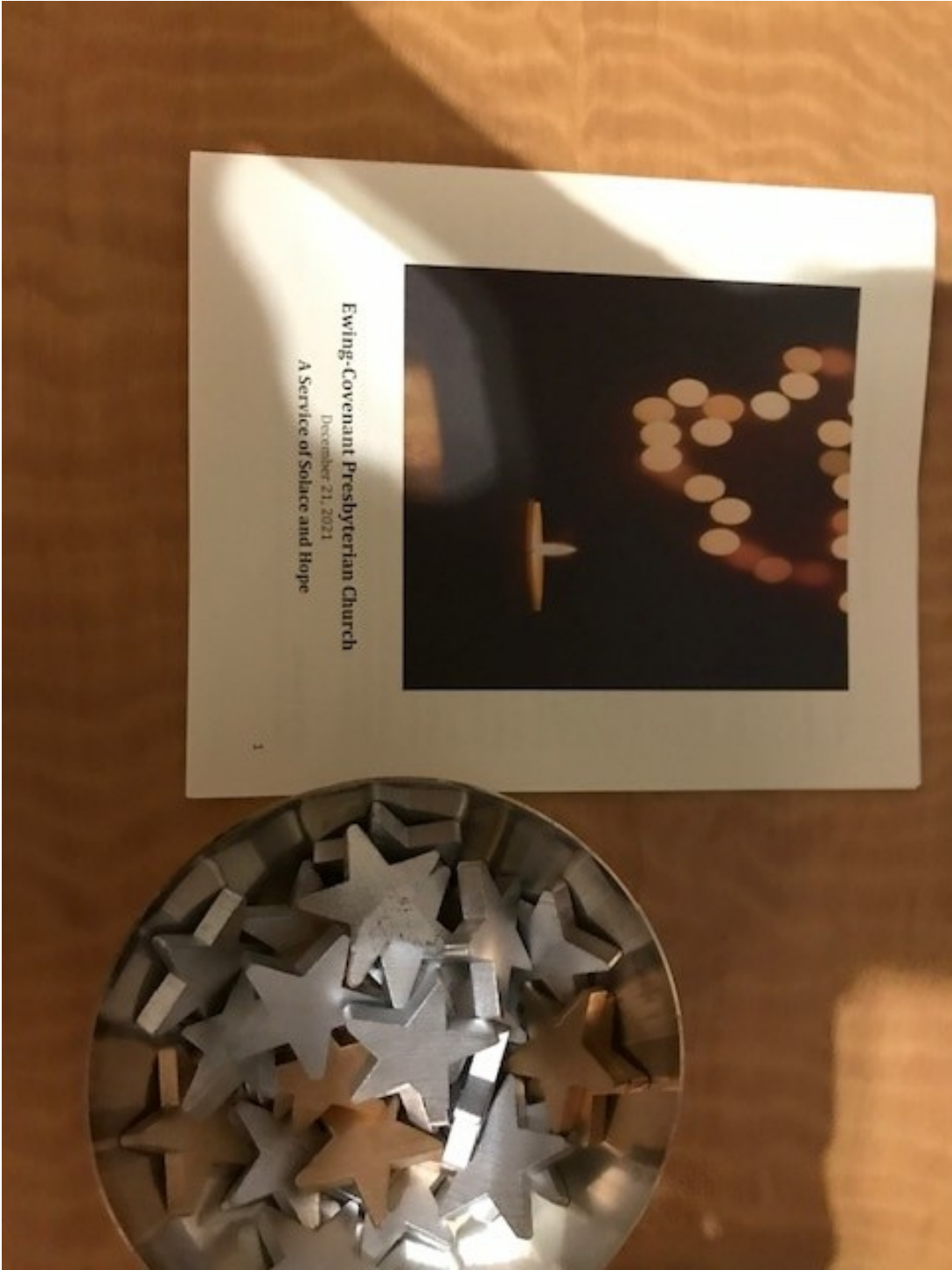
