RETURN TO CHURCH COMMITTE

Sunday Morning Guidelines We welcome you as you enter for worship this morning. As you enter, we ask the following of you:

- 1. If you have not already done so, please fill out a "Hold Harmless" form. Remember that you only need to do this once. *
- 2. Fill out the Health Form for the day. This helps us know who is present so that we will be able to track who was in attendance should it become necessary for any health-related reason.*
- 3. We ask that you remain masked until you leave the worship service and are again outside.
- * For your convenience, an updated <u>COVID Screening</u> Questionnaire is now available on the church website.

WHY DO WE ASK THAT YOU CONTINUE TO WEAR A MASK? First, know that the Return to Church Committee and the Session are continually examining our protocols and procedures related to the COVID Pandemic. We realize that the State of New jersey has eliminated almost all restrictions for those who are vaccinated and recommends social distancing and masking for those not vaccinated be continued. Yet, the Pandemic continues to be with us, and the new variants of the disease is heavily striking the unvaccinated. And, while the effectiveness of the vaccine is incredibly high, it is still possible for a vaccinated person to contract Covid while suffering symptoms at a less dangerous level.

While the percentage of our congregation who have been vaccinated is high, we also know that there are those in our midst who are not able to be vaccinated for any number of reasons, including choice. We are an open congregation, welcoming any and all who come to gather with us in worship. We ask that all who attend our worship in person remain masked in order to respect and protect everyone, from the youngest child who cannot be vaccinated, to the oldest person who has been vaccinated but is still vulnerable to the Covid virus. It is for "the least of these" in our midst that we will continue to ask people to wear their mask during in-person worship.

We recognize that masking is difficult for some. If your mask becomes unbearable, we encourage you to step out of the worship service (yes, even during the sermon) and remove your mask once you have passed to the outside.

Per Capita should be paid early in 2022

HELPING OUT OUR COMMUNITY



Many of the 90,000 temporary workers living in New Jersey package and process products for the largest corporations in the world for as little as \$13/hour. Even before the pandemic, this created extreme gaps between our incomes and the costs of food, rent, medical care and utilities. Now the situation is dire, as workers who lost jobs in the pandemic struggle to make it through the winter, and as government stimulus programs and moratoriums preventing evictions have ended. Utility shutoff moratoriums are also about to end.

EASTERN SERVICE WORKERS ASSOCIATION (ESWA), a free and voluntary, unincorporated private membership association of service, temporary and other low-paid workers in Central New Jersey, organizes a free-of-charge, self-help Benefit Program, including emergency food, preventive medical care, non-emergency dental care, legal assistance and more, forging unity among membership families and allies to collectively fight to eliminate our poverty.

ESWA's Winter Survival Campaign includes our Benefit Plan II program, where enrolled members can receive supplemental food, warm clothing and blankets, and other resources to help budget mandatory household expenses. With this added stability, members can better participate in organizing projects to advance the fight to end poverty at its root.

FEBRUARY UPDATE

The Visioning Team continues to work steadily towards its goals without interruption. The draft Mission Study Report we began in December is nearing completion. In the New Year, we compiled the *Survey of Personal Characteristics Desired in Our New Pastor* which was submitted by the congregation online and on paper. We will share the results with Session in a special meeting so they can determine which are the top qualities we should seek in a new pastor. Also, the Session will discuss the current temporary name of our blended congregations and consider a possible new name for our church. This is being considered now that we have been blended for more than 18 months and have opened new bank accounts by the Asset Allocation Team which require the new corporate name to be registered with the state. We also need a visual identity in the community based on the chose name.

Lastly, we plan to meet with our new Consultant, David Redman, affiliated with the Presbytery. He will guide us on next steps in preparing the Mission Study for approval by the Committee on Ministry.
