Update with Visioning Team on Sunday, March 6

Visioning Team Update

The past month was a productive time for the members of the Visioning Team.

- On February 7 via Zoom at a Special Meeting of Session (to which all members of the congregation were invited), we led a conversation with all who were present to narrow down the number of names being considered for the permanent name of our blended church. The revised shortened list for further consideration by the congregation and Session were:
 - Ewing-Covenant Presbyterian Church
 - Ewing Covenant Presbyterian Church
 - Scotch Road Presbyterian Church
 - Unity Presbyterian Church
 - Vineyard Presbyterian Church

At that same Zoom meeting, the Visioning Team also discussed the results from the survey sent to the congregation in November about *Personal Characteristics Desired in Our New Pastor* at the February open meeting. This list was also discussed and through consensus was reduced to 12 features. See next page.

- Our new advisor/moderator, David Redman from Presbytery, met with the Visioning Team on February 14. Going forward, David will moderate bi-weekly meetings with the team.
- The members of the Visioning Team are wrapping up their individual sections for the Mission Study, and the team is reviewing each other's contributions before submitting it to Session.

In all of its work, the Visioning Team is not forgetting why it is doing its work: to create a document that will present a description of the congregation (and its vision for the future of our church) that represents the feelings of as many members of the congregation as possible to applicants for the position of Installed Pastor.

Grief Groups


Are you mourning a loss, or a series of losses? Here are two Grief Groups you might like to join.

Over the past several years, we've witnessed an increasing cry for help and mercy in a world torn apart by disasters, violence, poverty and hunger, racism, disease (particularly COVID-19), and a host of other human crises. The problems can indeed seem overwhelming. Thankfully, when we all do a little, it adds up to a lot!

During Lent, we will be receiving the One Great Hour of Sharing offering. Please consider giving generously on **Palm Sunday, April 10**.

For more than 70 years, One Great Hour of Sharing has provided us with a way to share God's love with our neighbors in need. In fact, OGHS is the single, largest way Presbyterians come together every year to work toward a better world. Your gifts make this work possible!

The One Great Hour of Sharing offering is divided among three Presbyterian programs.

<u>PRESBYTERIAN DISASTER ASSISTANCE (PDA)</u> Works alongside communities as they recover and find hope after the devastation of natural or human-caused disasters, and support for refugees. (32%)

PRESBYTERIAN HUNGER PROGRAM (PHP) Takes action to alleviate hunger, care for creation, and the systemic causes of poverty so all may be fed. (36%)

SELF-DEVELOPMENT OF PEOPLE (SDOP) Invests in communities responding to their experiences of oppression, poverty and injustice and educates Presbyterians about the impact of these issues. (32%)

Per Capita should be paid early in 2022

Attention all members of Ewing-Covenant Presbyterian Church of Ewing! The per capita assessment for 2022 is \$40.00 for each adult member of our Church. These funds are used to further the work of the Presbytery of New Brunswick, the Synod of the Northeast, and the General Assembly. Each church is required to pay the per capita.

Since these are really "pass through" funds, we ask that you pay your per capita by the end of January. Your prompt payment will be especially helpful in assuring that pledged dollars support the programs and activities approved for Ewing Covenant Presbyterian Church, and don't have to be diverted to cover the per capita assessment. On Sunday, March 13th Ewing-Covenant Church will be hosting a Sock Drive in conjunction with Assemblywoman Verlina Reynolds-Jackson's sponsorship of *NJ Socks for the Homeless Day*. The drive is to benefit one of our communities most vulnerable, the homeless population.

Every shelter agrees that socks are one the most requested item but is the least donated item. We take for granted the simple task of being able to put on a clean pair of socks daily, our homeless population does not have the same privilege. Most do not have the means to wash their clothes on a regular basis, so it is necessary to have more socks than the average person. More often than not, they only own a single pair and rarely are they in good condition or are warm enough during the winter months.

How can we help?

On Sunday, March 13th, bring pairs of new socks to church. They can be brought to the church or the Scout Hut before the 13th (collection boxes will be in both locations), but the 13th will be *Sock It to Me Sunday*. So, feel free to wear a pair of fun socks that day as well.

What type of socks are best?

NEW socks for men, women and children are greatly appreciated and needed year-round. There is a greater need for men's black crew socks.

The socks will then be donated to the Rescue Mission in support of the Socks For Homeless Day.



RETURN TO CHURCH COMMITTE

Sunday Morning Guidelines We welcome you as you enter for worship this morning. As you enter, we ask the following of you:

- 1. If you have not already done so, please fill out a "Hold Harmless" form. Remember that you only need to do this once. *
- 2. Fill out the Health Form for the day. This helps us know who is present so that we will be able to track who was in attendance should it become necessary for any health-related reason. *
- 3. We ask that you remain masked until you leave the worship service and are again outside.

* For your convenience, an updated <u>COVID Screening</u> Questionnaire is now available on the church website.

WHY DO WE ASK THAT YOU CONTINUE TO WEAR A MASK? First, know that the Return to Church Committee and the Session are continually examining our protocols and procedures related to the COVID Pandemic. We realize that the State of New jersey has eliminated almost all restrictions for those who are vaccinated and recommends social distancing and masking for those not vaccinated be continued. Yet, the Pandemic continues to be with us, and the new variants of the disease is heavily striking the unvaccinated. And, while the effectiveness of the vaccine is incredibly high, it is still possible for a vaccinated person to contract Covid while suffering symptoms at a less dangerous level.

While the percentage of our congregation who have been vaccinated is high, we also know that there are those in our midst who are not able to be vaccinated for any number of reasons, including choice. We are an open congregation, welcoming any and all who come to gather with us in worship. We ask that all who attend our worship in person remain masked in order to respect and protect everyone, from the youngest child who cannot be vaccinated, to the oldest person who has been vaccinated but is still vulnerable to the Covid virus. It is for "the least of these" in our midst that we will continue to ask people to wear their mask during in-person worship.

We recognize that masking is difficult for some. If your mask becomes unbearable, we encourage you to step out of the worship service (yes, even during the sermon) and remove your mask once you have passed to the outside.
