Dedication of Renovations made possible by Joyce Pillsbury Bequest

On December 4th, the congregation gathered to dedicate renovations that were made possible by a generous bequest from Joyce Pillsbury. The most substantial work funded by her bequest was rebuilding the front porch of the office building and making the office wheelchair accessible by raising the level of the deck of the porch and installing a wheelchair lift. However, the bequest also funded the replacement of the back porch and back door of the office building and the replacement of the wheelchair lift in the Education Building and restoring wheelchair access to the Worship Space. Joining us to unveil dedication plaques were Joyce's son, Don Pillsbury, and his wife, Jackie.

Many members of the former Ewing Church perhaps did not know that Joyce was an accomplished artist. The Pillsbury family recently donated one of her paintings to ECPC: a beautiful watercolor of the office building—appropriate, since Joyce's bequest provided for so many improvements to the office building.

Joyce's bequest also will serve others beyond our own congregation. Session had voted to tithe the bequest. Westminster Presbyterian Church received a \$10,000 gift to further its urban ministry; several other ECPC mission partners also received substantial donations: the Living Waters Ministry (which helps to construct facilities to produce clean drinking water in the Yucatan), Karla Koll, a PC(USA) Mission Worker in Costa Rica, the Tres Rios Presbyterian Church in Costa Rica, the Head Start Program that shares our building, Trenton Rescue Mission, Ewing Meals on Wheels, and Friends for Health in Haiti.

We have been blessed by Joyce's generosity and will hold memories of her in thanks. Thank you also to the Pillsbury family for the donation of her painting.

















Congregation Discusses Vitality

After the Congregational Meeting on Sunday, November 20, the newly designated Vitality Team met with more than 30 curious and interested members. Rick Durham opened with prayer and Joanne Durham read the top three *Strategic Planning Priorities* which are action items established after the 2021 church retreats which were recorded by the Visioning Team.

The question was brought up, "Why talk about vitality now? Why not wait until we get a new pastor installed?" The response from other members was emphatic: "We cannot wait months for a new pastor to take steps to revitalize our church. We, the congregation, are the church, not the new pastor." Rev. Molly Dykstra and Rev. Nina Reeder have been invited to return to ECPC to speak to us more about Vitality.

Seven members of the congregation have pledged to serve on the new Vitality Team which kicks off in January. Please Remit your Per Capita Assessment

The Per Capita Assessment is a fundamental way in which all of the nearly 10,000 congregations of the Presbyterian Church (USA) connect, participate, and share in the work of the wider church. The Per Capita funds support the work and the missions of our own Presbytery of the Coastlands, the Synod of the Northeast, and the General Assembly.

For 2023, each church in the Presbytery will contribute \$40 per member. These funds cover our share of the costs of belonging to the denomination and is collected at the beginning of the new year.

Members of *Ewing Covenant Presbyterian Church* are asked to make a \$40 contribution to cover the church's cost for the assessment for each of the adult members of the congregation. Please use the blue Per Capita Apportionment envelope provided in your box of offering envelopes, or indicate "Per Capita" on the memo line of your check. We ask that you pay your per capita by the end of January, if possible. (If you haven't picked up your 2023 offering envelopes, they are available on the back table of the Worship space.)

Adult Education -- Honor Sabbath

The hectic weeks before Christmas can be exhausting to say the least! Many of us look forward to a fresh start in the new year, often with New Year's Resolutions. If you're ready to press the "Reset" button, join the adult education study after worship on Sundays! During January, we will be exploring the much needed "day of rest."

The Sabbath can often become just another day of the week. It is so much more than that. Our understanding of Sabbath comes from the Hebrew word Shabbat, which means "to cease." This ability to cease was realized after the exodus, when having the Sabbath meant that the Israelites could stop their 365-days-a-year earthly labor and take every seventh day off. They learned that the Sabbath was a holy day. The word holy was more about being set apart than about being righteous or pure. A Sabbath day was to be different from other days, in a sacred sort of way, exchanging day-to-day rhythms of labor for holy rhythms. Honoring Sabbath recognizes this rhythm of work and rest and places the Sabbath at the center of our faith practice.

January 8 Celebrate Sabbath (Matthew 12:1–8)

January 15 Rest with God (Genesis 1:26-2:3; Mark 6:30–46)

January 22 Live in Holy Rhythm (Exodus 20:8–11)

February 5 Return with Gladness (Luke 13:10–17)



The Church Christmas Card: Continuing the Tradition


